The funerals took place on Sunday of the two members of the staff and the two members of C.C.C. who lost their lives in the accident last Saturday. They were buried at Maalla, and their funerals were attended by a large number of their friends from the site. Our heartfelt sympathy goes to their families.

The 1955 Poor Relief Appeal was officially opened by H.E. the Acting Governor, Mr. E. D. Hone, at a ceremony held in Crater on Sunday afternoon. A Carnival Procession had toured Sheikh Othman, Khormaksar, Maalla and Steamer Point in the morning, and Crater before the opening ceremony.

"I cannot think of a more worthy object for charity than that contained in the slogan 'Protect Aden's Poor' ", said His Excellency. "You may ask why it is that Government are not raising all the money and undertaking all the work themselves. To this question I would give three answers. Firstly, Government provides regularly £.5,000 each year for Poor Relief in the Colony. Secondly, there is a personal duty on all members of the Community to help its less fortunate members. Thirdly, Government are doubling, from its reserve, the amount subscribed by the public. So if you think that Government are not giving enough, the remedy is simple - give a little more yourself and Government must do the same".

After the ceremony pamphlets describing the objects of the Appeal and the programme for the week were dropped from an aeroplane which made several runs over Crater, creating what looked like the first snowstorm to be seen in the Colony.

After a period during which there were very much fewer accidents on the road from Steamer Point than there had been when it first opened, the sides of the road are once more strewn at intervals with the remains of recent accidents. These form an unpleasant reminder that conditions on the roads in the Colony - and not least on those which look the safest - are still very dangerous. Drivers are reminded that the speed limit in Little Aden and in built-up areas the other side is 30 m.p.h. - except for a short stretch of 40 m.p.h. on the Maalla Straight - and that everywhere else in the Colony the limit is 40 m.p.h. In their own interests and in the interests of public safety all drivers are advised to keep strictly within these limits, and to be specially careful at night, because of the danger of ill-lit vehicles.

THE NIGHT MY NUMBER CAME UP

Twelve men and a girl - reliving a dream that foretold disaster. That is the theme of this tremendously exciting melodrama of the air. During a dinner party in Hong-Kong, a naval officer relates a dream in which he was travelling in an aircraft - a Dakota - carrying thirteen persons, which drifts off course and finally crashes. The following day, the host at dinner, along with some other of his guests, embarks on an important flight in a Dakota to Tokyo, and immediately realises that certain conditions tally with the dream he has heard related the night before. As the flight progresses, and the evidence multiplies that this is actually the aircraft seen in the dream, his fears and apprehensions overtake the other passengers and the crew. Michael Redgrave acts with dignity as a senior Air Force officer, Alexander Knox plays the nervous diplomat dinner-host, and Sheila Sim appears as the only woman passenger in the aircraft. The storm, fog and crash sequences are hair-raising in their realism, and the suspense is gripping to the end.

ROMEO AND JULIET
